The New Science of Cities - Michael Batty 2017-07-28

He examines the size of cities, their internal order, the transport routes that define them, and the locations that fix these networks. Then, using largely the same tools, he presents design and decision-making models that predict interactions and flows in future cities. These networks emphasize a notion with relevance for future research and planning: that design of cities is collective action.

Urban planning is a craft learned through practice.
